NOTRE DAME RETURNS FROM CHRISTMAS BREAK WITH VISIT TO RICE

Playing for only the second time in the last 16 days, Notre Dame should be well-rested when it suits up Friday at 7 p.m. (CST) for a battle with Rice at Autry Court in Houston. The Irish (5-4) are currently riding a three-game winning streak and looked anything but rusty in their last contest, racing out to a 22-4 lead in the first 12 minutes and rolling to a 60-33 win over Marquette last Saturday at the Joyce Center.

The 2001-02 season has had two distinct chapters for Rice (5-3). The Lady Owls started the year off well, winning their first five games, including a triple-overtime victory at Massachusetts and a 67-54 win

over No. 21 George Washington. However, Rice's early-season success has faded in the wake of three consecutive losses, two to nationally-ranked opponents Texas Tech and LSU. The Lady Owls also fell to Arizona, a team that beat Notre Dame on Nov. 24.

Rice has been on a week-long hiatus since a 72-47 loss at No. 24/23 LSU on Dec. 20 in Baton Rouge, La. Center **Johnetta Hayes** and guard **LaTonya Sam** each scored a team-high 10 points for the Lady Owls, with Hayes adding eight rebounds and three blocks. The visitors were hampered by a poor shooting night, hitting only 28.8 percent (19-of-66) of their field goal attempts.

Rice is paced by guard **Kara Liggett**, who is the only player scoring in double figures at 11.9 points per game, despite starting just twice in eight games. She also is the leading perimeter scoring threat for the Lady Owls, connecting on a team-high 20 three-point field goals this year.

Forward **Elisa Inman** is Rice's leading rebounder with 6.9 caroms per game, while Hayes blocks 2.6 shots per game. Guard **Kim Lawson** runs the point for the Lady Owls, dishing out 3.6 assists per game.

As a team, Rice is shooting 33.4 percent from the field and 35.5 percent from three-point range while scoring 61.2 points per game.

Christy McKinney is in her ninth season as the Lady Owls' head coach, owning a 139-101 (.579) record. She has guided Rice to three postseason appearances, including its first-ever NCAA Tournament berth in 2000. McKinney is 0-1 in her career against Notre Dame.

SCOUTING THE IRISH

Notre Dame looks to write a new chapter in its rapidly-developing history as the Irish defend their first NCAA championship in 2001-02. Seven monogram winners, including two starters, return from last season's title-winning squad, giving head coach **Muffet McGraw** a broad foundation from which to build this year. In addition, the Irish welcome six talented freshmen to the fold, a group heralded as perhaps the finest recruiting class in school history and ranked as high as third by several national publications.

McGraw is in her 15th year at Notre Dame with a 327-121 (.730) record and has led the Irish to six straight NCAA Tournament appearances and eight overall. She was a near-unanimous choice as national coach of the year in 2000-01, winning top honors from the Atlanta Tipoff Club (Naismith Award), Associated Press, Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), and Sports Illustrated for Women. She also was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year, marking the third different conference to recognize McGraw as its top skipper since she took the reins at Notre Dame in 1987.

Both of Notre Dame's returning starters were honored by the BIG EAST coaches in their preseason balloting. Senior guard/forward **Ericka Haney** (6.3 ppg., 5.0 rpg.) was a second team preseason all-conference pick and brings explosive quickness and versatility to the Irish lineup, along with veteran leadership. As Notre Dame's only captain, she is being called upon to assume a greater mantle of responsibility in '01-02. After starting the first six games for the Irish, she has moved into a reserve role in the last three games, picking up her first double-double of the year with season highs of 12 points and 10 rebounds against Western Michigan. Junior guard **Alicia Ratay** (12.3 ppg., 5.3 rpg.) was a first team preseason all-BIG EAST choice and is one of 30 finalists for the Naismith Award after setting an NCAA record for three-point percentage (.547) by a sophomore last season. On Dec. 6 at Purdue, she became the 19th player in school history to score 1,000 career points.

Joining Ratay in the backcourt is sophomore **Le'Tania Severe** (9.2 ppg., 4.0 rpg, 5.4 apg), who was hampered by injuries last season, appearing in just 22 games, but has confidently taken control of the Irish offense this season. She scored a career-high 17 points against USC and matched her career best

with eight assists against Western Michigan. She also ranks fifth in the BIG EAST Conference in assists and eighth in steals (2.0 spg.). Juniors Monique Hernandez (0.2 ppg., 0.6 rpg.) and Karen Swanson (1.3 ppg., 0.8 rpg.), along with sophomore Jeneka **Joyce** (5.3 ppg., 2.1 rpg.) give McGraw tremendous flexibility in her guard rotation. Joyce has started the last three games for the Irish, the first starting assignments of her career, and she leads the team with a .435 three-point percentage. Additionally, freshmen Allison Bustamante (4.0 ppg., 2.7 rpg.) Jill Krause (0.0 ppg., 0.5 rpg.) and **Kelsey Wicks** (4.1 ppg., 3.3 rpg.) provide the Irish with solid ballhandling and perimeter shooting depth. Bustamante made a solid return to action against Marquette, recording season highs of six points and four rebounds after missing the previous four games with a high right ankle sprain.

A pair of freshmen (and former Parade All-Americans) are making an immediate impact on the Notre Dame front line, as forward **Jacqueline Batteast** (13.6 ppg., 8.2 rpg.) and center **Teresa Borton** (5.1 ppg., 5.8 rpg.) started the first six games for the Irish. Batteast was named the 2001-02 preseason BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and her combination of speed, athleticism and perimeter shooting ability already make her a valuable weapon in the Irish arsenal. Already a three-time BIG EAST Rookie of the Week, Batteast is among the league leaders in scoring (11th), rebounding (3rd), field goal percentage (13th, .419), blocks (7th, 1.33) and double-doubles (1st, 4), picking up her fourth double-dip with 11 points and 12 rebounds against Marquette. Meanwhile, at

6-3, Borton is a smooth and versatile post player with excellent mobility and a solid defensive presence. She showed tremendous promise in her first collegiate game against Valparaiso, scoring a game-high 14 points and grabbing a game-best nine rebounds. Junior **Amanda Barksdale** (5.6 ppg., 4.0 rpg., 4.8 bpg.) was one of the nation's top shot blockers last season and has recovered nicely after missing Notre Dame's first four games with a stress reaction in her right leg. She notched seven blocks against USC and recently tied a school record with eight blocks against Marquette — both outings are tops in the BIG EAST this season and rank among the best single-game performances in the nation in 2000-01. However, her 4.8 bpg. average does not yet appear in the conference or NCAA ranking because she has yet to play in enough games to qualify. Meanwhile, freshman **Katy Flecky** (4.1 ppg., 3.5 rpg.) was a two-time Miss Colorado Basketball and offers the Irish an physical presence in the post. She came off the bench to notch seven points, six rebounds, two blocks and two steals in 13 minutes vs. Marquette.

RECAPPING MARQUETTE

Freshman forward **Jacqueline Batteast** tallied her fourth double-double of the season, and second in as many games, finishing with game highs of 11 points and 12 rebounds to spark Notre Dame to a 60-33 win over Marquette last Saturday before 7,132 fans at the Joyce Center. It was the third consecutive win for the Irish (5-4), who have allowed just 43.3 points per game during that stretch while extending the nation's longest home winning streak to 43 games.

Junior center **Amanda Barksdale** was a force on both ends of the floor, nearly compiling a triple-double with a career-high-tying 10 points, eight rebounds and a career-best eight blocks. The latter figure also tied the school record for rejections in a game, a mark she now shares with **Ruth Riley** (vs. Duke, 11/21/98) and **Shari Matvey** (at Wisconsin-LaCrosse, 3/15/80).

Led by Barksdale, Notre Dame held the Golden Eagles (5-6) to opponent season lows of 33 points and 18.5 percent shooting (10-of-54) — the 33-point defensive effort ties the fourth-lowest opponent total in school history and the .185 shooting ratio is the lowest by an Irish foe since Butler connected at a record-low 14.9-percent clip (9-of-61) on Jan. 30, 1984. Notre Dame also held a commanding 54-33 rebounding edge against Marquette and recorded a season-high 13 blocks on the way to their 22nd win in the last 23 games against MU.

Early on, Saturday's game bore a striking resemblance to last season's matchup between the two clubs. A year ago, Notre Dame jumped out to a 19-2 lead before the Golden Eagles held their ground and played the Irish even the rest of the way. This time, Notre Dame raced out to a 22-4 advantage, forcing Marquette to misfire on its first 12 shots before Katie Alsdurf ended the drought with a three-point field goal 12:34 into the game.

The Irish wound up taking a 37-13 lead at the half behind their defense, which allowed Marquette to shoot just 13.6 percent (3-of-22) in the opening 20 minutes. It also marked the third consecutive game in which Notre Dame had allowed less than 25 points in the first half — opponents are averaging 15.7 points in the opening half over that three-game stretch.

The trend continued into the second half, as the Irish went on a 9-2 run to kick off the period and take their largest lead at 46-15 with 13:27 to play. Meanwhile, Marquette missed 12 of its first 13 shots before putting together an 8-2 spurt which cut the lead to 25 points. However, that would be as close as the visitors would get the rest of the way, as Notre Dame maintained control.

After missing most of the first half with foul trouble and grabbing just one rebound, Batteast completed her double-double in the second frame with 11 points and 11 boards. Along with Barksdale, she helped drive the Notre Dame post offense which held a commanding 36-8 scoring edge over its Marquette counterparts. In all, 10 different Irish players cracked the scoreboard in the victory.

NOTRE DAME TRAVEL PLANS

While in Houston, Notre Dame is staying at the Doubletree Hotel at Post Oak (713-961-9300). Following their game with Rice on Friday night, the Irish are scheduled to return to campus on Saturday via commercial airline, getting back to South Bend around 12:30 p.m. (EST).

THE NOTRE DAME-RICE SERIES

Friday's game marks just the second all-time meeting between Notre Dame and Rice. The two schools first played last season, with the Irish earning an 80-40 win on Dec. 31, 2000, at the Joyce Center. Guard/forward **Ericka Haney** posted a double-double in the victory, finishing with game highs of 18 points and 12 rebounds. Center **Ruth Riley** also chipped in 18 points and guard **Niele Ivey** nearly pieced together a triple-double, winding up with 13 points, nine rebounds and seven assists.

The Notre Dame defense keyed the victory over the Lady Owls, holding Rice to 22.6 percent from the field (14-of-62). The Irish also owned a +22 edge on the boards (58-36) and didn't allow one Rice player to score in double figures.

OTHER NOTRE DAME-RICE SERIES TIDBITS

- Notre Dame charted its second-highest rebound total of the 2000-01 season against Rice, snatching 58 boards in the win. The only better outing for the Irish was a 62-rebound night against Alcorn State in the first round of the 2001 NCAA Tournament.
- The Irish also limited Rice to a .226 field goal percentage in last year's game, the third-lowest mark by a Notre Dame opponent in 2000-01, and the lowest by a regular-season non-conference foe.
- Junior guard Karen Swanson had one of her best days in an Irish uniform last season against Rice, scoring a career-high five points in six minutes against the Lady Owls. She tied her scoring standard earlier this season with five points against Army.

NOTRE DAME-RICE CONNECTIONS

- Junior center **Amanda Barksdale** is a native of nearby Friendswood, Texas, and was a recordsetting shot-blocker at Clear Brook High School. The 6-4 post continues to return to her home each summer and regularly plays pickup games on the Rice campus. Additionally, she has faced several members of this year's Rice team during those pickup affairs. Barksdale estimates she will have approximately 100 family, friends and supporters in attendance at Friday's game.
- Rice assistant coach Marla Brumfield, a former standout with the Lady Owls from 1996-2000, now
 plays for the WNBA's Miami Sol, where she is a teammate of former Notre Dame All-America center
 and 2001 consensus national player of the year Ruth Riley.
- Both head coaches played in the now-defunct Women's Professional Basketball League (WPBL), which existed during the late 1970s and was a precursor to the present-day WNBA. Notre Dame head coach Muffet McGraw spent one season as a point guard for the California Dreams, while Rice skipper Christy McKinney (formerly Earnhardt) played a year with the Dallas Diamonds.

IF NOTRE DAME WINS ...

- · Notre Dame would record its first road victory of the season.
- · The Irish would extend their winning streak to a season-high four games.
- Notre Dame would even its record at 4-4 against the current Western Athletic Conference alignment and pick up its first-ever road win against a WAC opponent.
- · The Irish would notch their fifth win in the last six visits to the state of Texas.

- Notre Dame would assure itself of a winning record in the month of December, the 36th consecutive month in which the Irish will have finished with a .500 or better record (dating back to Dec. 1994).
- The Irish would improve their overall record to 93-16 (.853) over the last three-plus seasons.

IRISH INJURY REPORT (as of Dec. 27)

Notre Dame has no major injuries to report.

NOTRE DAME AGAINST THE WESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

Notre Dame has played a current member of the Western Athletic Conference just seven times in its history, posting a 3-4 (.429) record. In addition to Rice, the Irish also have faced Louisiana Tech (1-2), Southern Methodist (1-1) and Hawaii (0-1), but has not played any of those schools since 1990. In fact, only Rice and Hawaii were members of the WAC at the time they played Notre Dame — SMU was playing in the old Southwest Conference when it matched up with the Irish in 1982 and '84, while Louisiana Tech was an Division I independent program when it battled Notre Dame in 1983, '84 and '90.

Irish head coach **Muffet McGraw** is 2-0 in her career against WAC schools, defeating 11th-ranked Louisiana Tech, 71-66, on Dec. 28, 1990, at the St. Joseph's Texaco-Hawk Classic in Philadelphia, and downing Rice, 80-40, last season at the Joyce Center.

DEEP IN THE HEART OF TEXAS

Notre Dame is 6-5 (.545) all-time against Texas schools, including a 4-3 mark (2-1 on the road) under 15th-year head coach **Muffet McGraw**. The Irish have played more games against Texas Tech than any other Texas institution, facing the Lady Raiders three times, all in NCAA tournament play. TTU owns a 2-1 series lead over Notre Dame, having last faced the Irish in the 2000 NCAA Mideast Regional Semifinals at The Pyramid in Memphis. Notre Dame also has met Rice (1-0), SMU (1-1), Southwest Texas (1-0), Texas (1-1), Texas A&M (0-1) and TCU (1-0) in its history.

The Irish are 10-10 when playing in state of Texas, a figure which is highlighted by seven postseason appearances in the Lone Star State. Notre Dame competed in the National Women's Invitation Tournament (NWIT) four times (1986, '89, '91 and '95), going 5-7 in that time with third-place finishes in '86 and '95. The Irish also played in three NCAA Tournament subregionals in Texas — sandwiching visits to Lubbock in 1996 and 1998 around a 1997 sojourn to Austin. Notre Dame went 5-2 in those NCAA games in the Lone Star State, including its first-ever NCAA victory (73-60 over Purdue) in 1996 and a stunning 74-59 win over fifth-ranked Texas Tech, the top seed in the Midwest Region, on its home floor in the second round of the 1998 tourney.

HOLIDAY HOOPLA

After a six-day hiatus for the Christmas holiday, Notre Dame will be back in action Friday night at Rice. The Irish are 15-9 (.625) in their first game after the yuletide season, including wins in five of their last six games. Probably the most notable post-Christmas game for Notre Dame came exactly 11 years ago, on Dec. 28, 1990, when the Irish downed No. 11 Louisiana Tech, 71-66, at the St. Joseph's Texaco-Hawk Classic in Philadelphia. Over the first 19 seasons of the Irish program, Tech remained the highest-ranked team Notre Dame had defeated and it was one of the first landmark victories in the storied 15-year career of Irish head coach **Muffet McGraw**.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

Notre Dame has turned up the defense in its last three games, holding USC, Western Michigan and Marquette to an average of 43.3 points per game while limiting them to a combined .266 field goal percentage (47-for-177). In addition, the Irish blocked a season-high 13 shots in the win over Marquette (including a school-record eight swats by **Amanda Barksdale**), and averaged 49.3 rebounds in those three contests, highlighted by 56 rebounds against WMU, the second-highest total for the Irish this season.

Notre Dame also has extended its defensive clamps to the three-point line, where opponents are now a paltry 11-of-62 (.177) over the last <u>four</u> games, including a 1-of-13 performance by seventh-ranked Purdue on Dec. 6.

FIRST HALF FRENZY

In its last two games, Notre Dame has used some dominating first-half performances to take control early and keep both Western Michigan and Marquette off balance. The Irish outscored both foes by a an average score of 34.5-12.5 while shooting 56.6 percent (30-of-53) during that span. Conversely,

WMU and Marquette shot a combined 16 percent (8-for-50) in the first half and both teams scored less than 15 points in the opening 20 minutes.

Against Western Michigan, Notre Dame held the Broncos to a season-low 12 points, the fewest first-half markers by an Irish opponent since Georgetown scored 10 points in last season's BIG EAST Conference Championship quarterfinals. Then, against Marquette, the Irish held the Golden Eagles to a season-low 33 points and 18.5 percent shooting from the field (10-of-54), marking Notre Dame's best defensive performance since it held Butler to a school-record .149 field goal percentage (9-of-61) on Jan. 30, 1984.

BARKSDALE'S BLOCK PARTY

Junior center **Amanda Barksdale** already has opponents dealing with rejection through the first month of the season. Although she missed Notre Dame's first four games with a stress reaction in her leg, she still leads the Irish with 24 blocked shots (4.8 per game). In fact, she would lead the BIG EAST Conference and rank among the nation's top shot blockers, but she has yet to play in enough games to qualify for either rankings. Nevertheless, she has been at her best in the last three games, averaging 6.3 swats per game, including a school-record eight blocks against Marquette last Saturday.

In her career, Barksdale has 116 career blocks, making her only the fifth player in school history to reach the century mark in career rejections. She is averaging 1.71 blocks per game in her three-year career, which is second in Irish history behind only 2001 consensus national player of the year, **Ruth Riley**, who averaged 2.82 swats per game from 1997-2001.

ALICIA ALMOST AUTOMATIC FROM THE LINE

Junior guard **Alicia Ratay** has been nearly perfect from the free throw line this season, making 22 of 23 charity tosses for a sparkling .957 free throw percentage — that figure would lead the BIG EAST Conference (and rank fourth nationally) if she had enough attempts to qualify. The Lake Zurich, III., native also has made 13 consecutive free throws, dating back to her final two shots at Colorado State on Nov. 21. Additionally, since the start of last season, she has made 90.6 percent of her foul shots (87-of-96).

Ratay is Notre Dame's career free throw percentage leader by a wide margin, connecting on 86.8 percent of her charities (171-of-197) in her three-year tenure with the Irish. **Mollie Peirick** (1994-98) is second on the career free throw percentage list with an .819 ratio.

WINNING BY THE MONTH

Another indication of Notre Dame's continued rise to national prominence has been its consistent run of success. Case in point — the Irish have posted a record of .500 or better in 35 consecutive months dating back to December 1994. That month, Notre Dame stumbled to a 1-4 record (1-6 overall), but recovered to finish 21-10 and finish third at the National Women's Invitation Tournament (NWIT).

TWO MORE IRISH GAMES SLATED FOR TELEVISION

The Notre Dame games at Miami on Jan. 2 and Seton Hall on Feb. 2 now are scheduled to be televised regionally. The Miami contest will air on Fox Sports Florida, while the Seton Hall tussle will be shown on CN8, The Comcast Network in Philadelphia. Check local listings for broadcast times and availability.

NOTRE DAME AMONG NATIONAL ATTENDANCE LEADERS

Notre Dame is ranked seventh in the nation, according to the latest unofficial attendance figures compiled Monday by the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Department. The Irish have averaged 7,464 fans for their five home games, nearly 1,100 more than last season, when Notre Dame was ranked ninth in the country in attendance with an average of 6,376 fans per game.

IRISH HOPING TO ENJOY ALL THE COMFORTS OF HOME

After a rugged first month of the season that saw Notre Dame face three ranked opponents and play four of its first six games away from home, the schedule now appears to balance out over the next month. The Irish currently are in the midst of a stretch where they play six of eight games at the Joyce Center, including a successful three-game, 13-day homestand which wrapped up last Saturday with a win over Marquette. After Friday's contest with Rice, Notre Dame will play host to DePaul on New Year's Eve before opening BIG EAST Conference play Jan. 2 at Miami.

A LITTLE COMPARISON SHOPPING

Prior to the 2001-02 season, Notre Dame head coach Muffet McGraw compared her team to the 1997-

98 Irish squad. Through eight games this season, that comparison seems to be holding true in several ways. Here's a look at some of the similarities between this year's club and the '97-98 unit:

IRISH GOING THROUGH BASIC TRAINING

For the sixth time in the last eight seasons, Notre Dame played three ranked opponents in its first seven games, going 0-3 against Colorado State, Michigan and Purdue (all away from home). However, recent history has shown that these early-season tests have proven invaluable later in the year — during this stretch, the Irish have gone on to make six consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, reaching the Sweet Sixteen four times and the Final Four twice, including the 2001 national championship. Additionally, in the previous seven seasons (1995-2001), Notre Dame has gone on to win 20 games each year, carding four 25-win campaigns and two 30-win seasons.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK

With six freshmen on this year's roster, Notre Dame is certainly going through some growing pains. However, the Irish rookies are getting a great deal of college experience this season, as evidenced by their production through nine games of the 2001-02 campaign. Notre Dame's freshmen have accounted for 42.4 percent of the points (246 of 580), 47.1 percent of the rebounds (190 of 403) and 38.6 percent of the minutes (694 of 1800) recorded by the Irish this season. Additionally, Notre Dame has started two freshmen (Jacqueline Batteast and Teresa Borton) in its first six games this year, and four of the six Irish rookies are averaging at least 12 minutes per contest.

A SEVERE DEVELOPMENT

Sophomore guard **Le'Tania Severe** has quickly adapted to her new role as the starting point guard for the Irish, filling the large shoes of All-American **Niele Ivey**. Through nine games this season, Severe is third on the team with 9.2 points per game and leads the squad with 5.4 assists per game, ranking fifth in the BIG EAST Conference in the latter category. Entering the 2001-02 campaign, her career highs were seven points and two assists and she had played in just 22 games due to injury.

Severe has proven to be a scoring threat when necessary, pouring in a career-high 17 points in a win over USC Dec. 9. She also has been adept at distributing the ball to her teammates, handing out at least five assists five times, including a career-high eight assists Dec. 6 at Purdue and Dec. 12 against Western Michigan.

IT'S BATTEAST, TO SAY THE LEAST

Although the season is only one-third over, Freshman forward **Jacqueline Batteast** already is showing a great deal of the potential which led the BIG EAST Conference coaches to vote her as the league's preseason Rookie of the Year. The South Bend, Ind., resident is a three-time BIG EAST Rookie of the Week selection and is tied for the league lead with four double-doubles this season (Colorado State, Army, Western Michigan and Marquette), in addition to scoring in double figures in eight of Notre Dame's nine games. This season, Batteast leads the team in scoring at 13.6 points per game (11th in the BIG EAST) and rebounding at 8.2 boards per outing, good for third in the BIG EAST. She also is ranked among the league leaders in field goal percentage (13th, .419) and blocked shots (7th, 1.33 bpg.).

CRASHING THE BOARDS

Despite losing its top two rebounders from last year (**Ruth Riley** and **Kelley Siemon**), Notre Dame doesn't appear to have broken stride in the rebounding department this season. The Irish have averaged 44.8 rebounds per game through nine games in 2001-02, owning a +9.4 edge on the glass, which ranks among the top 30 in the nation according to the latest NCAA statistical reports.

Leading the charge on the boards for Notre Dame have been a pair of freshmen — forward **Jacqueline Batteast** is setting the pace at 8.2 rebounds per game (ranking third in the BIG EAST

Conference), while center **Teresa Borton** is second with 5.8 caroms per contest. In fact, six different players are averaging at least four rebounds per game. Additionally, the Irish have been potent on the offensive glass, collecting 16.2 offensive rebounds per game. Batteast and Borton also are setting the pace in that category with 27 and 26 offensive caroms, respectively — figures which rank eighth and ninth in the BIG EAST.

THE BEST OFFENSE IS A GOOD DEFENSE ...

Over the last five-plus seasons, Notre Dame has discovered that a solid defensive effort can almost certainly guarantee a victory. In fact, since the beginning of the 1995-96 season (Notre Dame's first in the BIG EAST Conference), the Irish have an amazing 92-1 (.989) record when they hold their opponents to less than 60 points in a game. Curiously, the only time that notion didn't come to pass was last season, when Rutgers handed Notre Dame a 54-53 loss, one of only two setbacks the Irish suffered en route to the 2001 national championship.

The Irish already have added to this total five times during the 2001-02 season, turning the trick in all five of their home games — Valparaiso (35 points), Army (57), USC (49), Western Michigan (48) and Marquette (33).

... BUT SOMETIMES YOU HAVE TO SCORE IF YOU WANT TO WIN

Not resting solely on its defensive laurels, Notre Dame also seemingly has found the magic mark when it comes to outscoring its opponents. Over the last five-plus seasons (1995-96 to present), the Irish are 80-3 (.964) when they score at least 80 points in a game. The only blemishes on that record are a pair of overtime losses to Texas A&M (88-84) and Michigan State (87-83) in 1995 and a 106-81 loss to Connecticut in 1998. Notre Dame contributed another win to that growing record when it rang up 89 points in a win over Army on Nov. 26.

NOTRE DAME MAKING A LIVING BEYOND THE ARC

Notre Dame has established itself as one of the top three-point shooting teams in the nation over the last three seasons. The Irish led the nation in three-point percentage last year, hitting 46.4 percent of their shots from long distance — in fact, over the last six seasons, Notre Dame has averaged better than 10 three-point attempts per game. The Irish also set a new school record with 28 three-point tries in their win over Army on Nov. 26.

However, this year's season-opening win over Valparaiso produced an offensive anomaly for Notre Dame. The Irish were held without a three-point field goal, breaking a streak of 50 consecutive games in which they had made at least one trey. Prior to that game, the last time Notre Dame had gone dry from beyond the arc was Jan. 26, 2000, at St. John's.

Notre Dame didn't waste time in starting up a new three-point streak, canning 47 triples in their last eight games (5.9 treys per game). The Irish have now made at least one three-pointer in 154 of their last 156 games, a streak which stretches back more than four seasons.

FRESH FACES IN THE IRISH LINEUP

Notre Dame had a decidedly youthful look in its starting lineup when it opened the season Nov. 18 against Valparaiso, as freshmen **Jacqueline Batteast** and **Teresa Borton** got the nod at forward and center, respectively. In doing so, the pair were first rookie tandem in 20 years to start a season opener for the Irish — **Ruth Kaiser** and **Mary Beth Schueth** cracked the starting five in a 78-44 win over St. Joseph's (Ind.) on Dec. 2, 1981. Borton paced the Irish with 14 points and nine rebounds against the Crusaders, while Batteast scored two points and grabbed five rebounds against Valparaiso.

THE END OF ONE STREAK ...

For the first time since the end of the 1997-98 season, Notre Dame was not ranked in either of the major national polls on Dec. 3. The exclusion snapped a 60-week run in the ESPN/USA Today poll and a 56-week stretch in the AP rankings. This week, the Irish earned eight points in the Associated Press poll and seven points in the ESPN/USA Today poll.

... BUT THE CONTINUATION OF ANOTHER

Thanks to Kent State's loss at home to Rhode Island on Dec. 1, Notre Dame now owns the longest active home winning streak in the nation at 41 games. The Irish have not lost a game at the Joyce Center since Dec. 8, 1998, when Connecticut logged a 106-81 victory. Notre Dame's home winning streak next will be put to the test on Monday when DePaul pays a visit to the Joyce Center.

RATAY NAMED NAISMITH CANDIDATE FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

Notre Dame junior guard **Alicia Ratay** has been selected as a preseason candidate for the 2001-02 Naismith College Basketball Player of the Year Award. It marks the second time in as many seasons that Ratay has been named to the 30-player preseason Naismith watch list.

Ratay averaged 12.9 points and 5.1 rebounds per game last season, and set an NCAA record for three-point percentage (54.7 percent) by a sophomore on the way to third-team all-BIG EAST Conference honors — she was the only sophomore to make any of the three all-league squads. Ratay also is a former BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and was named an honorable mention All-American by the Associated Press in 2000. She will be looking to follow in the footsteps of her former teammate, **Ruth Riley**, who won the 2000-01 Naismith Award, becoming the first Notre Dame women's basketball player to be so recognized.

The Naismith Awards, in their 34th year, are given in honor of the inventor of the game of basketball — Dr. James Naismith. The awards program was founded by the Atlanta Tipoff Club, an organization dedicated to recognizing the achievements of student-athletes in basketball. The Awards, including Men's and Women's Coach of the Year, Male and Female Prep Player of the Year and Men's and Women's Official of the Year, are determined by a vote of the Naismith Board of Selectors. In addition, the Board of Selectors, comprised of a select group of leading basketball coaches, journalists and administrators, honors a Men's and Women's Outstanding Contributor to Basketball. The 2001-02 Naismith Award will presented April 5, 2002 in Atlanta.

NOTRE DAME PICKED SECOND IN BIG EAST PRESEASON BALLOTING

Fresh off a share of their first-ever BIG EAST championship last season, the Irish have been picked to finish second in 2001-02 according to a preseason poll of the league's coaches which was released at BIG EAST Media Day on Oct. 25. Notre Dame claimed two first-place votes and 155 points overall, trailing only Connecticut (11 first-place votes, 167 points). Rutgers, Boston College and Villanova round out the top five, with VU picking up the remaining first-place vote.

Individually, junior guard **Alicia Ratay** was a first team preseason all-BIG EAST selection after earning third-team honors last year. The Lake Zurich, III., native set an NCAA record for three-point percentage by a sophomore last season (.547) and is the top returning scorer for the Irish in 2001-02 after charting 12.9 points per game a year ago.

Senior guard/forward **Ericka Haney** also was recognized by the conference coaches, earning second team preseason all-BIG EAST laurels. She joins Ratay as one of two starters back from last year's NCAA championship squad and averaged 11 ppg. and 5.7 rpg. during the '00-01 campaign.

In addition, freshman forward **Jacqueline Batteast** was chosen as the preseason BIG EAST Rookie of the Year. It was one in a series of early-season honors for the South Bend, Ind., product, who also has been named a first team freshman All-American by the *Women's Basketball News Service* and has been tabbed as one of the Top 21 "New Players of Impact" by Women's College Hoops.com.

OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

This season, for only the fourth time in school history, Notre Dame has just one captain — senior guard/forward **Ericka Haney**. She is the first solo captain for the Irish since **Sheila McMillen** in 1998-99 and the second in head coach **Muffet McGraw**'s 15-year tenure.

IRISH HAIL FROM SEA TO SHINING SEA

The 13 players on this season's Notre Dame roster hail from 10 different states, including two each from Florida, Illinois and Ohio. Other states represented on the Irish roster include Colorado, Indiana, Kansas, New Mexico, Texas, Washington and Wyoming. The all-time Notre Dame women's basketball roster features players from 34 different states, including 23 during the **Muffet McGraw** era. Ironically, the most common home state on the Irish all-time roster — Michigan (14) — is not represented on this season's roster.

FUN WITH NUMBERS

This season, Notre Dame fans are seeing a pair of jersey numbers on the floor that haven't made an appearance in quite some time. Freshman guard **Kelsey Wicks** has chosen to wear No. 24, becoming the first Irish player since **Andrea Alexander** (1990-94) to sport those digits. In addition, freshman forward **Jacqueline Batteast** is wearing No. 21 this season, a number which has not been modeled by an Irish player since All-American **Beth Morgan** wore the same jersey from 1993-97. Prior to Morgan,

NOTRE DAME AMONG BEST IN GRADUATION RATES

The University of Notre Dame ranks among the top NCAA Division I-A institutions in five major graduation rate categories — all student-athletes, football players, male student-athletes, female student-athletes and African-American student-athletes — according to statistics released this fall by the NCAA.

The 2001 NCAA Graduation Rates Report, the 11th-such survey issued by the association, covers students who enrolled between 1991 and 1994 at Division I institutions, including 114 in Division I-A. The NCAA bases graduation rates on the raw percentage of student-athletes who entered an institution and graduated within six years. Students who leave or transfer, regardless of academic standing, are considered non-graduates.

Using the NCAA formula, Notre Dame graduated a four-year average of 85 percent of its student-athletes, fourth behind Northwestern (92 percent), Duke (91) and Stanford (88).

Among student-athletes who complete all four years of athletic eligibility at Notre Dame, not considering those who leave or transfer, 99 percent earn their degrees. The national average for Division I-A schools is 58 percent.

Notre Dame graduated 90 percent of all women competing in varsity athletics, to rank fifth in that category behind leader Northwestern at 98 percent. Among men, Notre Dame's 82 percent rate is fourth behind Duke at 90 percent, Northwestern at 88 percent and Stanford at 85 percent.

Notre Dame graduated 73 percent of its African-American student-athletes, ranking behind only Duke, Vanderbilt, Stanford, Northwestern and Rice.

IRISH CLOSING IN ON 500TH ALL-TIME VICTORY

Notre Dame is on the verge of becoming the 50th team in NCAA history, and the fourth BIG EAST Conference school to post 500 career wins. The Irish currently have an all-time record of 491-220 (.691), putting them just nine victories away from the magic mark. However, Notre Dame is in a dogfight with several other schools to see who will be the next to reach the 500-win plateau. NOW THAT'S A HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

Notre Dame is looking to continue some impressive streaks in 2001-02. The Irish have won a school-record 43 consecutive games at home, which became the longest active streak in the nation when Kent State's 43-game run came to an end Dec. 1 with a loss to Rhode Island. The Irish have not lost at home in more than three years, dating back to a defeat at the hands of top-ranked Connecticut on Dec. 8, 1998. Notre Dame also has a 49-3 (.942) record in BIG EAST games at the Joyce Center, with Connecticut the only league team to solve the Irish at home.

Notre Dame also sports a five-year, 27-game non-conference winning streak at the Joyce Center — a streak that includes victories over a trio of sixth-ranked teams (UCLA and Duke in 1998-99 and Purdue in 2000-01), as well as 25th-ranked Illinois in '98-99. Notre Dame's last non-conference loss at the Joyce Center came way back on Dec. 9, 1996, when 19th-ranked Wisconsin toppled the Irish, 81-69. Overall, the Irish are 68-2 (.971) at the Joyce Center in their last 70 home games, with the only losses coming to Connecticut.

Since its inaugural season in 1977-78, Notre Dame has played all of its games at the Joyce Center. The Irish own a 231-65 mark for a .780 winning percentage since that first season. Last year, the Irish were a perfect 15-0 for the second year in a row. The 15 victories are a school record for home wins in a season and the first time Notre Dame teams have been undefeated at home during the regular season. Also, since joining the BIG EAST Conference in time for the 1995-96 season, **Muffet McGraw**'s squad is 81-4 (.953) at the Joyce Center.

SEASON TICKET SALES REACH ALL-TIME HIGH FOR IRISH

Attendance at Notre Dame women's basketball games in 2000-01 increased nearly 88 percent compared to the previous season — and indications suggest another significant jump is in order for the 2001-02 campaign. Coming off the 2001 NCAA championship, there already have been more than 6,700 season tickets sold to the general public and University faculty and staff for the '01-'02 women's basketball season. That's compared to 2,700 a year ago and 940 in 1999-2000 — a jump of nearly 150 percent over last season, and a whopping 700 percent rise in just two years.

The sale of season tickets for the '01-02 campaign actually began midway through Notre Dame's 2001 championship season. All seats are reserved for Irish women's games for the first time this season — all seating in previous years had been general admission.

The Irish ranked ninth nationally in attendance last year at 6,376 fans per game, compared to 3,392

in 1999-2000. Notre Dame also recorded the first two women's basketball sellouts in school history, as 11,418 fans packed the Joyce Center for victories over top-ranked Connecticut and Georgetown.

All five of Notre Dame's home games in 2001-02 have attracted more than 7,300 fans, placing them among the top 12 crowds in school history (see chart on page 9). In fact, all of the top 20 crowds in the Notre Dame record book have occurred during the 15-year tenure of head coach **Muffet McGraw**.

NOTRE DAME FACES TOUGH SCHEDULE IN 2001-02

Notre Dame is slated to play 10 teams which reached the postseason as part of a rugged schedule this year. On the docket are seven NCAA Tournament squads, including four (Connecticut - 1/1, Purdue - 7/7, Michigan - 12/12 and Colorado State - 15/16) which are ranked in the Top 25 in the latest Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today polls. In addition, three Irish opponents (Boston College, DePaul and Virginia Tech) are receiving votes in one or both of the major rankings this week.

IRISH ON THE SMALL SCREEN

Notre Dame is getting a good deal of face time in 2001-02, playing on television at least eight times, including a pair of nationally-televised contests — Nov. 21 at Arizona (Fox Sports Net) and Jan. 21 at Connecticut (ESPN). The Irish also will make two regional television appearances this season — Jan. 2 at Miami (Fox Sports Florida) and Feb. 2 at Seton Hall (CN8, The Comcast Network).

In addition, Notre Dame will appear three times as part of the BIG EAST regular-season television package, playing host to Virginia Tech (Jan. 26) and traveling to Villanova (Jan. 12) and Rutgers (Feb. 16). All three of those games will be telecast live on Fox Sports Chicago as part of the league's TV deal. The BIG EAST Championship semifinals on March 4 also will be aired on the BIG EAST TV package, while the conference title game on March 5 will be broadcast live on ESPN2.

Additionally, the Dec. 6 rematch of the 2001 NCAA championship game between Notre Dame and Purdue was televised live statewide by LeSea Broadcasting, which includes WHME-TV (Channel 46) in South Bend and WHMB-TV (Channel 40) in Indianapolis.

NOTRE DAME RECEIVES COMMITMENTS FROM PAIR OF TOP 25 PROSPECTS

Notre Dame head coach **Muffet McGraw** announced Nov. 15 that two of the nation's top high school student-athletes have chosen to continue their careers with the Irish, signing national letters of intent to attend Notre Dame beginning in the fall of 2002. **Megan Duffy** (Dayton, OH/Chaminade Julienne HS) and **Courtney LaVere** (Ventura, CA/Buena HS) are the first players to commit to the Irish during the early signing period.

Duffy, a 5-7 guard, averaged 17 points per game last season for Chaminade Julienne High School in Dayton, Ohio. She was a 2001 first-team Division I all-state selection and earned honorable mention All-America accolades from *Street & Smith's*. Additionally, *Student Sports* tabbed her as a junior All-America selection. She was rated as high as No. 24 in the country by the All-Star Girls Report (ASGR) and No. 29 by *School Sports*.

LaVere, a 6-3 forward, tallied 13.8 points and eight rebounds per game last season for Buena High School in Ventura, Calif. She also shot 54 percent from the field and 73 percent from the free throw line for BHS, which was ranked in the top 10 nationally throughout the 2000-01 season by USA Today. In addition, LaVere was an All-America honoree by both *USA Today* and *Street & Smith's* last year, and she already has been selected as a preseason third-team All-American for the '01-02 campaign by *School Sports*. Like Duffy, LaVere also was a first-team all-state selection last season. She is a consensus top-15 player according to all of the major recruiting services — No. 10 by the Blue Star Index, No. 13 by *School Sports* and No. 15 by ASGR.

The additions of Duffy and LaVere already have given Notre Dame one of this year's top 10 recruiting classes, according to at least one recruiting outlet. The Blue Star Index has ranked the latest group of Irish signees sixth in the nation, marking the sixth consecutive year in which Blue Star has placed Notre Dame's recruiting class among the Top 20 in the country.

BOOK ON NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON MAKES PERFECT CHRISTMAS GIFT

Fans of Notre Dame women's basketball will be able to relive the 2000-01 NCAA championship season in a new book by **Mark Bradford** entitled "Nice Girls Finish First." The book, which hit store shelves Dec. 10, is the story of how the Irish and head coach **Muffet McGraw** put together a squad of truly remarkable young women, some of whom overcame great odds, to win the national championship last April. Included in the book are in-depth interviews with members of the Notre Dame senior class and starting lineup, giving an unique perspective on what it goes into putting together a championship team.

RUTH RILEY TO RECEIVE NCAA TODAY'S TOP VIII AWARD

Former Notre Dame All-American and Academic All-American **Ruth Riley**, the consensus national player of the year in women's basketball in 2001 and already winner of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship, was named a recipient of the NCAA Today's Top VIII Award on Dec. 13. The Today's Top VIII Award winners are a group of distinguished student-athletes from the 2001 calendar year who will be recognized at the 37th annual NCAA Honors Dinner, January 13, 2002, in Indianapolis, for athletics, academic achievement, character and leadership.

In addition to their athletics accomplishments, the NCAA Today's Top VIII recipients have earned numerous academic honors, have volunteered countless hours to community projects and have served as role models for their academic institutions and to their peers.

A two-time Associated Press first team All-American, Riley was selected as the 2001 BIG EAST Player of the Year and the AP and Naismith Women's College Player of the Year after helping lead Notre Dame to its first national title last spring. Off the court, Riley was selected as the Verizon Academic All-America® Team Member of the Year after being named first team Academic All-American for two consecutive years. She also was awarded with an NCAA postgraduate scholarship.

Riley averaged 19 points and eight rebounds a game, leading Notre Dame to a 34-2 record. The former Irish center is the only player in Notre Dame history to score more than 2,000 points and grab more than 1,000 rebounds.

An eight-time Dean's List selection at Notre Dame, Riley graduated in May with a 3.64 grade-point average in psychology and sociology. She was also selected as the BIG EAST women's basketball scholar-athlete of the year and the BIG EAST women's scholar-athlete of the year for all sports. Riley received the university's highest scholar-athlete honor when she was awarded the Byron V. Kanaley Award at the 2001 Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet.

Last April, she was chosen in the first round of the 2001 WNBA Draft, going fifth overall to the Miami Sol. In her inaugural professional season, Riley averaged 6.8 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.44 blocks per game (ninth in the league) while helping Miami, a second-year expansion franchise, qualify for the WNBA playoffs.

Recognition for the group at the Honors Dinner is in conjunction with the NCAA Convention in Indianapolis. CBS Sports broadcaster **Clark Kellogg** will serve as master of ceremonies for the event. Kellogg, a graduate of Ohio State University, was a standout basketball player at his alma mater and the 1982 No. 1 draft pick of the NBA's Indiana Pacers.

KRAUSE FEATURED IN "CONFESSIONS OF A FRESHMAN"

Freshman guard **Jill Krause** is giving fans an inside look at the 2001-02 Irish women's basketball team through regular diary entries on the Notre Dame athletic website, *www.und.com*. Entitled "Confessions of a Freshman," the Glenview, Ill., native is detailing her journey as a first-year player on the defending NCAA championship squad. Her diary entries may be accessed either from the front page or the women's basketball page on the Notre Dame website.

HANEY SHINES ON BIG EAST ALL-STAR TEAM

For the second time in as many years, Notre Dame sent a player with the BIG EAST Women's Basket-ball All-Star Team, as guard/forward **Ericka Haney** joined the squad for its six-game swing of Germany this summer. Haney followed in the footsteps of **Niele Ivey**, who helped lead the BIG EAST All-Stars to a 5-1 record during a junket through Canada in the summer of 2000.

Haney helped the BIG EAST, which was led by Syracuse head coach **Marianna Freeman**, to an unbeaten 6-0 record during its tour, scoring a team-high 18 points in a 103-57 win over Ludwigsburg/Malmsheim in the final game of the trip.

Haney finished with a team-high 13.0 points per game and collected 4.5 rebounds per game during her European vacation. She also scored in double figures in five of the All-Stars' six wins.

NCAA AND BIG EAST STATISTICAL LEADERS
