## **Irish Shooting For The Top Again In 2006**

When Randy Waldrum arrived at Notre Dame in 1999, he coached his first Irish team all the way to the national championship game. One year later, his 2000 team claimed the No. 1 ranking and did not lose until the College Cup semifinals. Notre Dame's postseason success then dropped off for a few years before returning in full force with the 2004 national championship season and a dominating 2005 campaign that ended with an NCAA quarterfinal loss to the eventual national champion Portland.

Now, with his eighth season on the horizon, Waldrum is looking to guide his team to a third straight elite-level season. Eight starters lead the way for a group of 17 veterans, as the Irish could be well-positioned to make another run at the program's third national title.

Notre Dame lost four key regulars – All-Americans Katie Thorlakson (forward) and Candace Chapman (right back), along with the Academic All-America duo of goalkeeper Erika Bohn and midfielder Annie Schefter – from the 2005 team that went 22-3-0, led the nation in scoring (4.40 goals per game) and allowed just 54 shots on goal all season. Top returners include two other All-Americans, senior midfielder Jen Buczkowski and sophomore forward Kerri Hanks, who both were among the final-15 candidates for the 2005 Hermann M.A.C. Trophy.

Six others return who have received all-BIG EAST honors, among them: versatile senior defender Christie Shaner, senior midfielder Jill Krivacek, junior forward Amanda Cinalli, sophomore midfielder Brittany Bock, sophomore central defender Carrie Dew and senior utility player Lizzie Reed. The only returning starter who has yet to be honored by the BIG EAST is the highly underrated Kim Lorenzen, a senior center back who will serve as the team's solo captain in 2006.

Top candidates to fill the open starting spots include three juniors: forward Susan Pinnick, outside back Ashley Jones and goalkeeper Lauren Karas. The 'keeper position is most up-for-grabs, with senior Nikki Westfall and freshman Kelsey Lysander also firmly in the mix.

Four of the other incoming freshmen figure to play key roles in the 2006 season, with that group including longtime teammates Michele Weissenhofer (forward) and Amanda Clark (defender/midfielder), battle-tested midfielder Courtney Rosen and versatile defender Haley Ford.

Hanks and Buczkowski again were among the 25 players named to the Hermann Trophy watch list for 2006, with Hanks also collecting various preseason All-America honors (plus BIG EAST preseason offensive player of the year). Those players were joined by Shaner (the league's preseason defensive player of the year), Cinalli and Bock in comprising five of the 11 players who were named to the 2006 preseason all-BIG EAST team.

The Irish enter the 2006 season ranked fifth in the NSCAA coaches poll, fielding a roster that has tightened up a bit on its geographical reach. The team now includes six players from Texas (most notably Hanks, Ford and Karas) while six all hail from Chicago: the senior trio of Buczkowski, Krivacek

and Lorenzen, plus the former Neuqua Valley High School teammates Bock, Clark and Weissenhofer. The roster also includes three players from southern California – Jones, Dew and Lysander – who all could find themselves in the starting lineup.

The eight-member senior class has set a leadership tone since their arrival early in the fall of 2003, combining to log 408 career games played while helping the Irish win nearly 90 percent of their games (67-7-2) during the past three seasons. As they look down upon the current freshman class, there could be a parallel to the 2003 season when four of the current seniors (Buczkowski, Krivacek, Lorenzen and Shaner) served as regulars on that talented team.

Waldrum traditionally has recruited versatile players and has not been hesitant to utilize position shifts and altered formations in order to maximize the roster's personnel. But to achieve the needed results, he knows that it requires the full commitment of the team.

"In this program, as with many of the other top teams, you will have stars come in and end up being reserves. The success of that situation is dependent on how both the coaches and players handle it," says Waldrum.

"In the past few years, our players have done a great job of buying into this philosophy and the resulting success speaks for itself. Another byproduct of our great depth is that it keeps us fresh on a weekly basis and also in the postseason, as you are less likely to see players breaking down at the end of the year."

Notre Dame's 2006 squad boasts three veterans (Buczkowski, Cinalli and Hanks) who have played with the U.S. Under-21 National Team, two others – Bock and Dew – who will be reporting a couple weeks late after wrapping up play with Team USA at the Under-20 World Championship, and another (Rosen) who is a product of the Under-17 National Team.

The Irish also head into 2006 looking to maintain an academic tradition within the program that just keeps getting better and better, with the team's 3.42 GPA in the 2006 semester representing the best among Notre Dame's 26 varsity programs. Several players will be top candidates for Academic All-America honors, led by Jones and her 3.96 cumulative GPA as an accounting major.

Notre Dame takes several noteworthy streaks into this weekend's action, having scored in 38 straight games (second-longest in NS history) while going unbeaten in 29 straight at Alumni Field (28-0-1) and riding a 66-game unbeaten streak at at home versus BIG EAST teams (65-0-1, since '95). The Irish have not lost in 19 consecutive overtime games (14-0-5, since '99) while the seniors have yet to play a game in which the Irish were outshot (78 games).

IRISH NOTES - The Irish are #1 in the Soccer Times coaches poll (plus 3rd per Soccer America and Soccer Buzz), after a 9-0 win ovr Iowa State and a 2-1 road win the next day at Mississippi ... it was the first time since 1996 that ND played on back-toback days ... ND has tied the team record for home unbeaten streak (29; 28-0-1, since end of '03 season) and has won 92% of its all-time home games (181-14-3) ... nine ND players were slowed by injuries in the preseason ... Notre Dame is 320-9-12 (.956) all-time when holding opponent to 0-1 goals and 233-3-1 (.984) when scoring 3-plus goals (135-1-0 since Oct. 6, 1995) ... the Irish are riding a 229-game win streak when claiming a 2-0 lead (252-0-1 all-time) ... ND owns a 104-27-7 all-time record in tournament action, including 42-14-6 in regular-season tournaments ... since 1994, the Irish are 30-7-3 in regular-season tournaments (with 21 of those wins coming vs. ranked teams) ... the Irish own a 56-13-2 overall record in tournament play during the Waldrum era ('99-'05), including 21-5-1 in regular-season tournament action ... since losing to Santa Clara and Portland (the teams that went on the play in the '02 NCAA title game) at the 2002 Notre Dame Classic, the Irish are 15-1 in their past 16 regular-season tournament game ... Michele Weissenhofer was named BIG EAST rookie of the week after totaling 2G-3A in the week-1 action (one of her assists came on a flip-throw and she also forced an own-goal) ... the Irish are riding the 2nd-longest scoring streak in ND history (38 games) ... no previous team in the program's 19-year history ever had faced the task of playing on back-to-back days in venues that were more than a couple hundred miles apart ... Kerri hanks has scored in 9 of the past 10 official fall games with the Irish ... ND is 20-0-0 when Hanks has scored a goal the past two seasons ... Amanda Cinalli's 64 career points are tied with Candace Chapman for 24th in ND history ... when including the exhibition games vs. Virginia and Xaver, nearly one-third of ND's goals this fall (6-of-19, including at least one in each game) has come off a set play ... the ND seniors are 69-7-2 for their careers, with Jen Buczkowski appearing in all 78 of those games (Christie Shaner in 77, Lizzie Reed in 74, Kim Lorenzen in 71 and Jill Krivacek in 70) ... Hanks scored the quickest goal ever in an ND season opener (1:19), vs. Iowa State, and became the quickest ND player to 30 career goals (26 games, besting Anne Makinen's 27) ... ND is 17-2-0 in season openers, including seven straight game-one wins and a 27-3 combined scoring edge in the past three season openers ... ND has won 20 straight games at Alumni Field (since a scoreless tie with Rutgers late in the 2004 regular season) ... the nine goals vs. ISU match the third-most of the Waldrum era (since 1999), behind the 11-1 win over UNH in the 2005 opener and a 10-0 win over Georgetown in '99 (the '03 team opened with a 9-1 win over Hartford, at UConn) ... Weissenhofer became the sixth ND player (done seven times) ever to factor into four-plus goals in a season opener (2G-2A).

SCOUTING THE BRONCOS - SCU is ranked as high as #1 in the nation (per Soccer Buzz), also 2nd per Soccer America and 3rd per Soccer Times, after 1-0 wins over Santa Clara and Wake Forest ... SCU returned 10 starters and 22 of 26 letterwinners from its 2005 team that went 17-5-2, finished 2nd (behind eventual NCAA champion Portland) in the West Coast Conference (4-2-1) and then advanced to the NCAA guarterfinals, losing a 2-1 game at Penn State ... one of SCU's top returning players (Tina Estrada) is out due to injury.

FROM RUSSIA, WITH LOVE - There will be five players in Russia with strong rooting interests in this weekend's games at Alumni Field, as ND's Brittany Bock and Carrie Dew are competing alongside SCU's Jordan Angeli and Amanda Poach (plus USC's Amy Rodriguez) on the U.S. Under-20 National Team that just played in the Under-20 World Championship (an 0-0 game that saw China advance, 5-4 on PKs) ... the USA will play Brazil on Sunday in the third-place game) ... Dew and ND's Ashley Jones were captain of the Cal-South ODP team that won the 2004 national title and included SCU's Brittany Klein, Meagan Snell, Courtney Lewis, Alexa Orand ... ND's Jen Buczkowski, Jill Krivacek and Kim Lorenzen were longtime club and ODP teammates with SCU's Julie Ryder (who alsoplayed with Buczkowski on the U.S. U-19s) ... Jones has past playing experience with several other SCU players (Kira Sarkesian, Dani Potts, Megan McCray, Angeli and Poach) ... ND's Molly larocci and SCU's Tiffany Roberts played together on the Sereno (Ariz.) Golden Eagles ... ND's Kelsey Lysander and SCU's Jenna Belcher were teammates on Cal South ODP.

**ND-SCU SERIES NOTES** – Notre Dame owns a 7-4-0 series record vs. Santa Clara (4-1 at home), including 3-0 in the NCAAs (1-0 in the 1999 semifinals, 2-1 in the 2000 quarterfinals and 1-0 in the 2004 semifinals) ... the teams played just twice in the first 11 seasons of the ND program (1988-98) but this weekend's meeting will be the 10th ND-SCU game in the past eight seasons ('99-'06) ... five of the games have seen one of the teams ranked 1st in the NSCAA poll (ND in '95, '00 and '05; SCU in both '99 games) - and that could have been the case this season but the NSCAA did not update its poll this week ... the home team is 7-2-0 in the series (5 at ND, 4 at SCU) ... ND lost at SCU in the 2005 season (2-1), with Jordan Angeli scoring twice for the Broncos while the Irish had a costly missed penalty kick.

Jim Millinder is 134-92-21 in 12-plus seasons as a college coach (126-65-17 at USC).

**FRIEND OR FOE?** – ND sophomores **Brittany Bock** and **Carrie Dew** currently are competing alongside USC's **Amy Rodriguez** at the Under-20 World Championship (in Russia, with Team USA) ... Dew also was a teammate of USC's Rosa Anna Tantillo on the 2005 U.S. Under-23 Select Team ... ND's **Courtney Rosen** also has past playing experience on the national-team level with Rodriguez ... Dew and ND teammate **Ashley Jones** were captains of the 2004 Cal-South ODP team that won the national title ... that team also included USC's Nini Loucks and Ashley Nick (plus four current Santa Clara players) ... Jones and Loucks also were teammates on the SoCal United team that won the 2004 national club title ... three players from each team (ND's Bock, Dew and Jones and USC's Rodriguez, Meagan Holmes and Stacey Strong) were invited to the U-20 team trials ... Bock and USC's Ashley Nick were members of the U.S. U-17 national-team program.

**FIRST-TIME VISITORS** – Since 1993, teams making their first visit to Alumni Field have gone just 3-40-1 vs. the Irish in those games (USC is facing ND for the first time) ... ND's all-time record in series openers is 76-25-2 (.745), including 43-5-0 since '93 and 50-8-0 in all series openers at home (25-3-0 since '93) ... the Irish opened last week by beating first-time opponents Iowa State and Mississippi ... Harvard is one of the teams that have lost to ND on their first Alumni Field visit (a 2-0 ND win in the 2000 NCAA third round, with the Irish beating Santa Clara the next week in a 2-1 quarterfinal that went to overtime.

**VETERAN COACHING TRIO** – The Inn at Saint Mary's Classic brings together three individuals who have combined for 773 wins in 57 combined seasons as college soccer head coaches: ND's Randy Waldrum (326-128-24, in 25) and Florida's Becky Burleigh (268-67-15, in 16) ... Smith has the 3rd-best career Division I win pct. (.779) among active D-I women's coaches (min. 10 seasons) while Waldrum is 7th (.779; 250-73-17) ... on the opposite side of the spectrum, Harvard's Erica Walsh is entering her fourth overall season as a college head coach and first at Harvard.



Harvard came to Notre Dame's Alumni Field at the start of the current decade, losing a 2-0 game to the Irish in the 2000 NCAA third round (the Crimson had upset Hartford the week before) ... current ND volunteer assistant Lindsey Jones was a junior defender on that 2000 team that was ranked No. 1 and lost to UNC in the NCAA semifinals.

**ND TOURNAMENT HISTORY** – Notre Dame has hosted a women's soccer tournament every year since 1992, going 21-3-2 in those games with a 75-25 scoring edge ... Santa Clara previously has played at the ND tournament in 2000 (1-6 loss to ND, 2-1 win over UConn), 2002 (4-0 win over ND, 4-2 win over Clemson), and 2004 (2-1 win over SMU, 2- loss to ND).



#### SANTA CLARA PREVIEW

The Santa Clara women's soccer team has not failed to reach the College Cup final weekend in back-to-back years since 1994-95, and the 2006 Broncos do not intend to break that stretch. Following a 2005 season which saw them extend the nation's longest current streak by advancing to the NCAA quarterfinal round for the 11th year in a row (falling 2-1 at Penn State), the Broncos now begin the march looking for an 11th trip to the NCAA semifinals.

Jerry Smith, with a career record of 313-79-26 (.779), is in his 20th season at the helm of the SCU program and is looking forward to the debut of a squad that returns 10 of 11 starters while welcoming nine hungry talented newcomers.


"Our best player in the preseason was Marian Dalmy, she's been playing tremendously," Smith said. "She's come back nicely [from injury] and has been a real leader. Lauren Zealear is such a gamer and I think that she is going to have a tremendous impact for the rest of the season.


"Up front, Kiki Bosio has looked great in training, as an attacking presence. Another freshman, Lindsey Johnson, is a leftfooted player who is exceptional with the ball.

Leading scorers from 2005 – Jordan Angeli (12G-5A) and Tina Estrada (11G-5A) – are absent for the opening weeks due to U.S. U-20 team commitment and injury, respectively, with Amanda Poach (U-20s) also not on hand. Meagan Snell (5G-6A) and Elyse Shelger (3G-3A) return to an attack that outscored opponents 47-15 in 2005. The front is bolstered by the addition of Bosio and prep All-American Lexi Orand, a veteran of the youth national teams and threetime NSCAA/adidas High School All-American.

Two transfers – defender Hillary Schwarzbach (from USC) and midfielder Chioma Igwe (California) add punch to the team. Brittany Klein, Tiffany Roberts and Hayley Siegel bring a combined 10G-9A in 2005 with them to the midfield while Schwarzbach will be joined on a back line that includes Dalmy, Zealear, Johnson and 2005 Freshman All-American Dani Potts.

Meagan McCray was the week-one goalkeeper, with senior Julie Ryder coming back from injury rehab.





USC PREVIEW By Darcy Couch (USC Sports Information)

As head coach Jim Millinder enters his 12th season overseeing USC soccer, he has the luxury of guiding a team with 16 returning players, including nine starters. Four seniors and four juniors are in line to guide the Trojans, who have four freshmen added to the roster for 2006.

Last year, USC's unique blend of half new and half veteran players was able to gel relatively quickly and put together a strong run into the NCAAs. USC posted a 13-6-2 overall record and finished third in the Pac-10.

Headlining the charge is All-American Amy Rodriguez, who starred on the front lines as a freshman (9G-7A). She will return two weeks into the season, after competing with the U.S. Under-20 National Team. Senior Rosa Anna Tantillo had 11 assists in 2005 (4G) to claim all-region and all-conference honors. Three others garnered All-Pac-10 recognition along with Rodriguez and Tantillo, as defender Meagan Holmes, forward Nini Loucks and midfielder Stacey Strong were named to the Pac-10 all-freshman team.

Junior goalkeeper Veronica Simonton already has chiseled her place in the USC record books, with 13 wins and 11 shutouts in 2005.

In addition to Rodriguez and Loucks, USC returns senior Tracy Lansing and junior Lauren Brown up front. Lansing has been a mainstay at forward with seven career goals while Brown was sidelined early in 2005 by a facial fracture

The flexible midfield is almost entirely intact from last season. In addition to Tantillo and Strong, USC has senior Jocelyn Hein anchoring the midfield along with sophomores Kelley Finch and Ashley Nick (each holding strong to the more transitional side of the game).

The defense was the staple of the 2005 season, with 12 shutouts thanks to the reliable anchors on the defensive line. At the core of that unit sits Holmes from her central position. Just ahead of her stands sophomore Janessa Currier, who has taken on the role of stopper. On the left wing resides senior captain Lindsay Parker while juniors Kat Stolpa and Laura McKee also are back. The athletic Simonton has the nod for the starting 'keeper job, with other options including redshirt freshman Brittany Massro and six-foot true freshman Kristin Olsen.

#### HARVARD PREVIEW

First-year Harvard coach Erica Walsh got her first look at her team as it kicked off its preseason. Time was short for Walsh to evaluate a squad laden with underclassmen (just three are upperclassmen, two juniors and one senior).

The 12-player freshman class has been rated as one of the lvy League's best and the newcomers will need to grow up quickly with an unforgiving slate of non-conference games.

Harvard returns seven starters but Laura Odorczyk is the lone senior and one of three captains, joining junior Megan Merritt and sophomore Nicole Rhodes. Odorczyk has been a backbone of the team's defense since appearing in 13 games as a freshman. The outside back helped support a defense, which owned a miniscule 0.47 goals-against average, with 11 shutouts to rank among the nations best.

Merritt is a former freshman All-America and all-region selection who started all 16 games last season. The team's second-leading scorer (4G-2A), Merritt tallied three gamewinners. Rhodes earned captain status after a standout freshman campaign in which she started all 16 games, alongside Odorczyk as the team's center back.

The 2006 campaign will be the second consecutive with an underclass-driven lineup, with Rhodes being one of four players to start every game as a freshman. Allison Keeley started every game at midfield and was third on the team in scoring with two goals including a game-winner against Ohio State; Erin Wylie led the team in scoring in her freshman season with five goals and 11 points; and Rachel Lau helped form a talented midfield unit while ranking third on the team in scoring on the strength of four assists.

Fellow returning players Megan Kerr, Zoe Sarnak and Maggie Robinson will vie for playing time with Kerr having appeared in eight games with one assist, and Sarnak playing in 11 games with one goal.

Robinson did not see time in net last season behind all-region netminder Katie Shields. The stiffest competition of preseason camp came between the pipes with the sophomore competing with freshmen Lauren Mann and Laura Dale.
